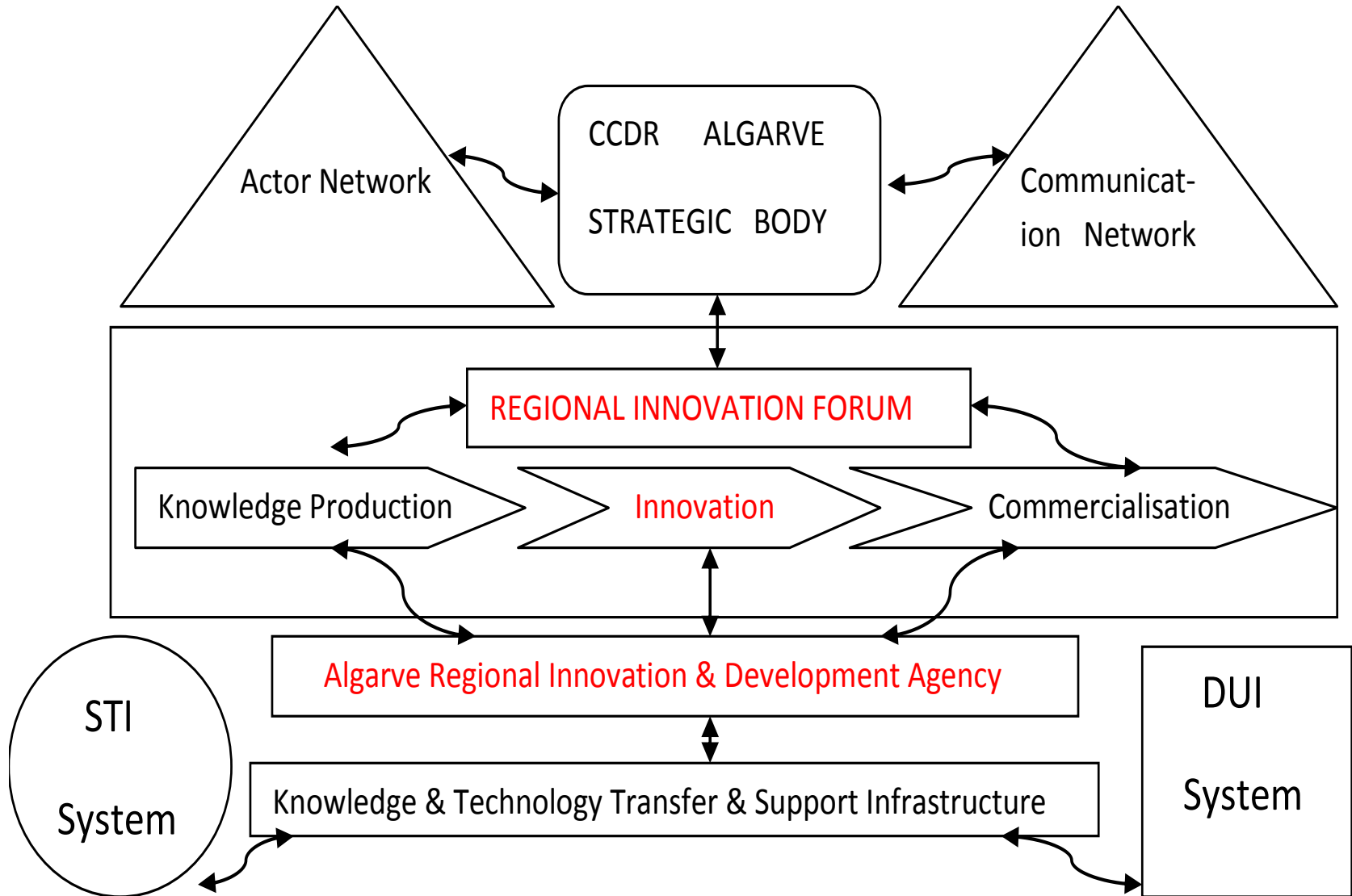
What to do in less developed or transition regions?

- In already highly specialised regions, try to diversify from the regional 'monoculture'
- In mixed development regions, also seek 'interface innovation' but integrate S&T knowledge into a 'Praxis' approach
- No clear model of how to do such DUI or DUI/STI innovation
- So, new model needed.

Towards a DUI innovation model: Algarve-style

- Have 'Thematic Issues' around which panels of industry representatives and/or entrepreneurs may interface for exploitation
- 'Learning from your industry' means 'niche opportunities' for exploitation can be ranked
- RDA must then be 'catalytic' in organising 'innovation theatre' entrepreneurs (key role involves:

Learning from your industry

- First, showcasing *existing* innovations from inside or outside the region, including abroad, that may be ‘preadapted’ modules or whole solutions for re-use in a new problem
- Second, showing potential innovations that explore the ‘White Spaces’ that no-one has yet
- RDA must then ‘orchestrate’ contests in which competition for RIS3 innovation subsidies and support occurs.

Strategic Niche Management

- Winners rewarded with projects (substantial private as well as public investment funding). (Key role for ARIDA)
- These may be early-stage and exploratory, mid-stage and examinatory, and final-stage and exploitative
- Finally ARIDA must establish a monitoring, learning and public communication system.

Conclusions

- Research and Practice show the STI-led innovation model *alone* is unsuitable for many regional innovation contexts
- Firms wish to interact more but lack the incentive
- Transversal/recombinant praxis can be DUI (or DUI/STI) leading to ‘preadaptive innovation’ - even ‘white spaces’ innovation - more exploratory
- Catalytic role as orchestrator/impresario for RIDA, a more practical “theory” of innovation
